### Kansas Historical Society FY 2022 Annual Report

#### A Note from the Acting Executive Director Patrick Zollner



The Kansas Historical Society ends the fiscal year 2022 with major changes and great anticipation. The last 12 months closed some chapters in our history and also furthered many crucial steps ahead toward the agency's future.

After years of planning, research, focus groups, and fundraising, we are ready to close the Kansas Museum of History for major renovations. The museum will close early in the next fiscal year. That closure

allows for the long process to remove, verify, photograph, conserve, and store artifacts in anticipation of the new exhibits to come. New exhibit planning is proceeding while exterior renovations and repairs begin at our Topeka complex. This step, like that of the Historical Society's incremental moves to west Topeka in the 1980s and 1990s, come with great anticipation. The locomotive and two cars arrived onsite to find their place in a museum gallery under construction. The artifact collections were carefully packed and transported to the new facility. The new Kansas Museum of History opened in 1984. Now, those galleries will close in preparation for new exhibits for the 21st century.

We note the untimely loss of Jennie Chinn, our executive director, in April 2022. She had served in that position since 2004. Jennie was proud of Kansas' unique history. The new exhibits project was especially important to her in sharing that story with Kansans. Her vision continues to inspire the agency's mission.

This past fiscal year marked a return to many of the public programs impacted by Covid-19. Staff members adapted to offering a blend of in-person and virtual programs for the public and schools. That flexibility helped the agency increase services to the public in the areas of children's school programs and curriculum, public programs, and grants and incentives.

Our work at the Historical Society is made possible by the dedicated staff members and volunteers, as well as our partners with the Kansas Historical Foundation. We appreciate the support of Governor Laura Kelly and the Kansas Legislature. We are grateful to the many private donors whose contributions advance the new exhibits project, and the people of Kansas who share our love of the state's history. We look forward with great anticipation to the year ahead as we advance major projects and initiatives. These are just a few of the highlights from fiscal year 2022.



This year the Sump Barn in Wabaunsee County was listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The listing conveys the history of this farm and the important role of the barn on Kansas farms and ranches. Built in 1913, the large barn supported the Hereford cattle, operation for 90 years.



The Herbert House in Fort Scott was listed in the National Register of Historic Places. The Queen Anne style, built in 1888, reflect the tastes of the owner who operated a paint and art goods store and is one of the city's largest and most intact historic residences.



Visitors enjoyed the Kansas Museum of History ahead of the closing in early FY 2023.



Attendance at Kansas State Historic Sites continued to rebound during the past fiscal year, as shown at Pawnee Indian Museum State Historic Site in Republic.



Exhibits installation began at Kaw Mission and the Last Chance Store State Historic Sites in Council Grove. The sites are expected to open in FY 2023.



The State Archives research room in Topeka continues to serve researchers and offer tours.



The Historical Society continues to expand its digital programs for the public and for schools. Virtual Museum After Hours, offered free every month, delves into topics related to Kansas history.



The Historical Society awarded 17 Heritage Trust Fund Grants totaling \$1,237,321. The restoration of the Stranger Creek Church in Leavenworth County was aided by two Heritage Trust Fund grants awarded in 2016 and 2020 totally over \$156,000. The project continued with the aid of a Kansas Rural Preservation grant in FY 2022.




Jennie Chinn served as executive director of the Kansas Historical Society, the state agency, from 2004 to 2022. She passed away on April 23, 2022. During her leadership, the Historical Society led efforts to commemorate the state's 150th anniversary, began reinterpretation of Kaw Mission and the Last Chance Store State Historic Sites in Council Grove, and began a multiyear planning, funding, and reimagining along with the Kansas Historical Foundation to create new exhibits for the Kansas Museum of History.

#### Kansas Historical Society FY 2022 Historic Rehabilitation Tax Credits

\$5,146,796 in State Rehabilitation Tax Credits were issued this fiscal year (thus far) from an investment total of \$112,063,902 (some projects are still undergoing the audit process at this time and credits have not been issued yet for those projects).

According to economic impact software created by the Center for Urban Research, Rutgers University, the investment in 2022 created 1,683 jobs in Kansas, which generated \$21,273,400 in total taxes, grew the economy of Kansas \$122,514,000, and generated \$69,300,200 in gross state product.




#### **Revenues by Fund: \$8,025,860**
